# Safeguarding **Children and Addressing Abuse**

#### The Archdiocese Addresses Victims' Concerns

The Archdiocese takes very seriously the needs of victims who approach the Church seeking healing from abuse. In addition to offering counseling and other support services, in appropriate cases, the Archdiocese provides reasonable compensation to those victims seeking a financial settlement of their civil claim, even after the statute of limitations has lapsed. Settlements are not confidential unless requested by the victim, and may include funding for continued psychological counseling.

The Archdiocese's general liability insurance coverage is the sole source of funds used to pay abuse settlements. Although the Archdiocese, parishes and schools pay premiums to purchase insurance, no parish or school assets, Archdiocesan assets or Annual Appeal or other fundraising collections are used to pay civil claims related to abuse cases.

# The Church's Role to Alleviate Economic Inequality

Being in the Christmas spirit, Saint Catherine's Church, a predominantly Caucasian congregation made up of young urban professionals in the downtown area of an American city, decided to reach out to the African-American and Hispanic residents of a nearby housing project, which was characterized by high rates of unemployment, domestic violence, drug and alcohol abuse, and teenage pregnancy. Most of the community was fearful of venturing into that neighborhood, but Father John insisted that the Church cared for the residents and that Christmas was the perfect time to show the Church's compassion.

The parishioners decided to buy Christmas presents for the children in the housing project. The parishioners went door to door, singing Christmas carols and delivering wrapped toys to the children in each apartment. Although it was awkward at first, the parishioners were moved by the big smiles on the children's faces and were encouraged by the warm reception of the mothers. Eventually this ministry expanded beyond Christmas to include special deliveries at Easter and Thanksgiving.

Years later, Father John noticed that the parish was struggling to find enough volunteers to deliver the gifts to the housing project. After the Masses one weekend, he asked parishioners to give him feedback on why their enthusiasm was waning, but it was difficult to get a clear answer. Finally, one parishioner came to meet Father on his way out of Mass and said to him,

Father, we are tired of trying to help these people out. We have been bringing them things for several years now, but their situation never improves. The just sit there in the same situation year in and year out. Have you ever noticed that there are no men in the apartments? The residents are all unwed mothers who just keep having babies in order to collect bigger and bigger welfare checks. They don't deserve our help. In reality, there was a different reason that there were few men in the apartments when the church came around to deliver the gifts. Oftentimes, when the fathers of the children heard the Christmas carols outside their front doors and saw the presents for their kids through the peepholes, they were embarrassed and ran out of the back door. The residents typically were unemployed for a host of reasons and this contributes to a deep sense of shame and inadequacy, both of which make it even more difficult to apply for jobs. The last thing these fathers need is a group of middle-to-upper-class Caucasians providing Christmas presents for their children, presents that they themselves cannot afford to buy.

Churches fail the poor. Ross Douthat of *The New* York Times claims, *There is a case that churches are failing poorer Americans. But the problem isn't how they spend money or play politics. It's a more basic failure to reach out, integrate, and keep them in the pews.* Churches harm the poor by failing to be a community of the relationally poor and instead focus on being a nonprofit to financially support the poor.

The Church gives away a lot of money and goods, as Saint Catherine's does, but this does not restore people's dignity. As Douthat points out, *The budgets of American religious charities and schools and hospitals and other nonprofits are tabulated in the tens of billions* but as the story highlights, this material charity, likely made the fathers even less able to apply for a job, thereby exacerbating the very material poverty that [Saint Catherine's] was trying to solve. Although the cash value of church-charity is highly impressive, how much of it is highly effective?

The hope then is that churches become communities that nourish the poor beyond finances. From a religious perspective, A church that pays out to help the poor, but doesn't pray with them, looks less like a church than what Pope Francis has described, unfavorably, as merely another [NGO] From a secular perspective it is more beneficial for churches to be churches because, the social benefits of religion are stronger further down the socioeconomic ladder, and these benefits are delivered through community, practice, and belonging. The more churches spend time and money advocating and sending money, without due reflection of its effectiveness, instead of forming people in Christ will ultimately lead to the church's further ineffectiveness, if not real harm, in the world of poverty alleviation and income inequality.

Catholics (this includes those who are poor themselves) owe the poor a church community not just cold cash. For Catholics, *Private charity remains a religious obligation that benefits the giver as well as the recipient* and therefore ministry can also be counted as a method of charity. Provide ministry not just money.

At first glance it may be easy to think that the church does help the poor through how much effort and goods it does give to materially poor persons. However, just like Saint Catherine's the church's explicit charity is most often a guise for ineffective, or worse, harmful, charity. Our role as parishioners is to be ministers to those in our church communities and to one another by being allies in faith to rebuild from below those relationships that are fundamentally damaged by economic inequality.
