## **Room for Error?**

I find the word discernment a little intimidating. It's my responsibility as a Christian to do God's will, but figuring out what that means is not simple. Every situation brings choices. It can feel overwhelming. How can we really know God's opinion, anyway?

Some people believe discerning God's will is a matter of following the simplest path. When things fall into place, it's a sign we're doing what we're supposed to. Others take the opposite view: Any worthwhile endeavor is bound to encounter opposition. Satan's job is to derail all good and holy work. So when the going gets tough, it's a sure sign you're on the right track. There's merit in both viewpoints, but the very contradiction between them illustrates the difficulty we face in trying to determine God's will. It would be nice if the choice between right and wrong was drawn clearly: Heaven: 26 years, exit here. Unfortunately, our lives are less like a limited-access highway and more like a swamp crisscrossed with countless paths—end points unknown. Trying to discern one "right" path could cripple a person were it not for this reality: In such a web of possibility, there's probably more than one way to get to heaven. As the late Fr. Richard Hogan said, "Otherwise, what is the purpose of free will?" Perhaps some paths are easier than others, but discerning wrongly will not automatically condemn a person to a lifetime of misery. I find that liberating. Yes, it's important to seek God's will, but no decision is so vital that there's no going back if I get it wrong. And that's good, because I'm bound to get it wrong once in a while. So, by all means, pray for guidance. Educate yourself on the options. Be still and listen. Then do the best you can. God doesn't ask for more.

# A Soul's Legacy

Early in my marriage, when my husband was in law school, I decided to trace my family history. Stories about stout-hearted immigrant ancestors who scraped together the fare for passage, and willingly left their families and everything they knew for what they hoped was a better life used to break my heart. But those stories also inspired me. These were sturdy and brave souls; braced for whatever awaited them on the distant shore. I felt compelled to know them better because I shared some of those traits.

At that time there were no online immigration records. Research involved letter writing, contacting distant relatives for copies of pictures, marriage licenses, birth certificates, and the hand written details inside the old family Bible.

It included working with translators who could communicate with village churches in the old country, and countless Saturdays spent in the New York Public Library combing through rolls of microfilm for census records, city directories, and vital records. It involved studying maps and taking road trips. It was a treasure hunt that led me to an amazing discovery.

My research began with my four grandparents, which turned into sixteen extended families. On and on it went. Through the process of collecting and weaving bits of data into family stories I actually developed a relationship with my ancestors. I felt I knew them somehow, and I did. Incredibly, I was able to

piece together vignettes of life through historical records: addresses and occupations, the age and number of children, whether they rented or owned, if they lived in a flat, over a store, with other relatives or took in boarders, and whether they had received their sacraments. All of these things plus what was happening locally and globally helped me "know" them. For most, life was difficult. Many were poor. I located news clippings and obituaries for children hit by a streetcar, or runaway horse, or who succumbed to an illness that is no longer a threat. I learned about their neighbors and what part of town they lived in, and if they were active members of their church or community.

In addition to facts, my research generated questions that had no answers, like how they spent their day, if they did acts of charity, who were the silent saints among them, and who might have been affected by a simple kindness, or a friendship between neighbors that changed a life for the better.

I discovered a profound level of human connection that revealed our divine union with God. I realized what I was doing was in fact honoring the lives of those who had passed ultimately honoring God, of whose great plan they were a part. Were it not for this divine union we would not exist. I honor them with my prayers in a special way on All Souls Day. Remember, the legacy we create begins with living in right relationship; it dwells deeply in the life of every single person with whom we share a moment, a kindness, or a generous act, as well as in the things we do to ensure a future for those souls who are with us and those yet to be born.

## Preparing for Mass By Praying at Home



The joy of being Catholic is in the Eucharist. The Most Holy Eucharist, also called Holy Mass, is the wellspring of Catholic life and its summit. The Catholic is, at every moment, caught up in one of three movements. Either one is on the way to church, giving witness to the Kingdom by preparing for the Sacred Banquet; or one is in church, participating fully, consciously, and actually in the Sacred Liturgy; or one is sent forth out of church into the world to bear witness to "that which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked upon and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life" (1 JOHN 1:1). The Church lives from Eucharist to Eucharist, amazed by the wonder of so great a gift, and awaiting her "blessed hope" (TITUS 2:13), the return of Christ in glory.

The Eucharistic life begins on the way to church.

Go to church with a heart made ready for the Mystery. Begin at home by reading the texts appointed for the day's Mass: first reading, responsorial psalm, second reading, and Gospel. The references for these texts are readily available in your parish bulletin, on your church calendar, or in your missal. Let the Word of God resonate in your heart; read the texts aloud, slowly, and with attention. Repeat the phrases that strike you. Let the Word itself become your prayer; send back to God the Word he has addressed to you. Then, for a few moments, remain in silence.

Adore the God who has spoken to you. Ask Him to give you hunger for the "daily bread" (LUKE 11:4) you will receive at Mass. Go to church with hunger and desire; you will not be sent away empty (CF. LUKE 1:53). Faithful to his promise, God will fill you with good things (CF. LUKE 1:53).

### **Baptism Information**

Baptisms take place on the 1st Sunday of every Month: 2 Baptisms per Mass at 10 AM & 12 Noon

Because they will be promising to help raise your child in the practice of the Faith, the church requires that at least one of your child's godparents be a 'fully initiated Roman Catholic;' i.e., one who has been Baptized and received the sacraments of Holy Communion and Confirmation. At the time of registering your child for Baptism, we ask that one of your chosen godparents provide a copy of their Confirmation certificate or some documentation from their church of Baptism or Confirmation indicating the month and year of their Confirmation.
