SAFEGUARDING CHILDREN AND ADDRESSING ABUSE: The Catholic Church is Battling Sexual Abuse

While most media focus over the past ten or more years has been on the incidents of sexual abuse within the Church, little has been said about the many positive steps that the Catholic Church has taken to address the issue.

Dioceses across the country, and especially the Archdiocese of Newark, have instituted compassionate outreach to victims and support services, training and background checks for staff and volunteers, training for children and youth, codes of conduct, reporting requirements to civil authorities, independent Review Boards to investigate allegations and recommend actions under Canon law for offenders, as well as other initiatives.

To date, the Catholic Church is the only youth-serving organization in the country – private or public — to undertake such a comprehensive program to create and promulgate safe environments for children and young people. Independent auditors from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops have found the Archdiocese of Newark to be fully compliant with the requirements of the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People in every year since audits began in 2003.

The "Forgotten" Person of the Trinity

Who is the Holy Spirit? The Bible says a great deal about the saving action of God the Father and Jesus Christ, the Son, but remains a little more abstract about the Holv Spirit. Perhaps this is the reason that, of three persons of the Trinity, the Spirit seems to get the least amount of attention. Addressing this fact, in January of 2015, Pope Francis said, We often pray to Jesus, we pray to the Father, especially when we pray the "Our Father" – but not so frequently do we pray to the Holy Spirit-it is true, no?-He is the Forgotten One...We need to ask for His help, His strength, Hisinspiration. Continuing, he said "the Holy Spirit, who entirely animated the life and ministry of Jesus, is the same Spirit who now leads who now leads Christian existence, the existence of [every] man and woman who say they are and want to be Christians ." Essentially, Pope Francis asserts that the Spirit gives our faith life (animates our faith) and therefore drives our Christian existence. Therefore, without the Spirit, we would not be able to live as disciples of Jesus Christ.

Jesus' Apostles and first disciples learned this soon after His Ascension, on the feast of Pentecost, which we celebrate today. The Acts of the Apostles narrates the story of the early Church, revealing what the Holy Spirit accomplished through those early Christian believers. According to Acts, before ascending to heaven, Jesus told the disciples to return to Jerusalem and await the Holy Spirit. Without Jesus being physically with them, they must have felt uncertain and afraid and yet they obeyed and returned to the city. Days later, as the whole community of disciples waited in the upper room, the Holy Spirit suddenly descended upon them. Their fear and doubt vanished and they were radically changed. The Holy Spirit filled them and poured out the his gifts upon them, giving them the courage to preach and live the gospel without fear, even in the face of persecution and the wisdom, knowledge, and understanding to and preach the word of God and live according to Christ's example.

Led by Peter and driven by the Spirit, the disciples left the upper room and went out into the streets of Jerusalem boldly preaching the gospel and performing miracles in Jesus name. Through their words and actions, many people came to believe in Jesus Christ. Eventually, their community, the early Church, spread across the Roman Empire, and today, Christians can be found in nearly every country. However, all of this became possible only after Pentecost, for it was only with the guidance and power of the Spirit that the disciples were able to accomplish all of this. This is the reason Pentecost is often referred to as the Birthday of the Church, for the existence of the Church is inseparably tied to the power and presence of the Holy Spirit.

But what does all of this mean for our lives today? Speaking to a group of charismatic Catholics in Rome in June of 2014, Pope Francis said, "Go forth into the streets and evangelize, proclaim the Gospel. Remember that the Church was born to go forth, that morning of Pentecost. Let yourselves be guided by the Holy Spirit, with that same freedom. And please, do not cage the Holy Spirit!" As disciples of Jesus Christ, we must be filled with the Holy Spirit, like the original community of disciples, so that we can carry out our mission to evangelize, to spread the gospel, throughout the world. To live up to this mission and to grow in relationship with Jesus, we need to turn to the Spirit, asking that he fill us and guide us along the path. With the Holy Spirit, we can begin the process of renewing our world by living and preaching the gospel.

As surprising as it may sound, the Holy Spirit can truly be a source of renewal for our world. It's easy to see that our world is torn by greed, hatred, conflict, violence, and poverty. These social ills are far from new and were a prominent feature of life under the Roman Empire as well. While the early Christians did not eliminate these problems from the world, they did bring renewal by choosing to live differently. The Acts of the Apostles tells us that the early Christians lived together in communities marked by the love of Christ. They loved their enemies and welcomed everyone, rich and poor, to join them. The community shared all money and property in common, giving to each according to need. While conflict did occur from time to time, love still prevailed. Many people became interested in Christianity because of this radically different way of life. The Holy Spirit enflamed the hearts of believers with agape, the love of Christ, which motivated them to live the gospel they preached. The New Testament shows us that this love has the power to alleviate suffering, stand against hatred, and end conflict. In essence, the Holy Spirit is the "fuel" for positive change in the world, replacing division with the unifying love of Jesus Christ. Let us turn to Spirit, the "Forgotten One," asking him to fill us with this love so that we can become agents of renewal.

Pentecost is often referred to as the Birthday of the Church because on that day more than 3,000 people were Baptized. The writer of the *Acts of the Apostles* refers to this celebration and so does St Paul in his letters to the Churches, so historically this feast has been part of our Church from the very beginning. We invite you to explore 5 aspects that could be useful in developing our spiritual life as we celebrate this Feast of the Holy Spirit: **grow a disposition of expectancy and openness, receive the Holy Spirit as energy, allow the Holy Spirit to move, change, and transform us, respond to the call of discipleship, live to evangelize.**

When the time for Pentecost was fulfilled

Something many Christians do not realize is that Pentecost (or *Shavuot*) was a Jewish holiday celebrated on the fiftieth day after the Feast of Unleavened Bread. Originally a time of thanksgiving for the wheat harvest, Shavuot is also a commemoration of



God's giving of the Law to Moses. What the Apostles were doing in the upper room was to devote themselves to prayer according to their tradition. Yet, just as Israel was brought together by the Law, it is in the context of the events of this particular feast following the Ascension of Christ, when the apostles were filled with the Holy Spirit and the Church was born. So, on Pentecost we celebrate the birthday of the Church: the event which fused the apostles to the living body of Christ. Imagine the energy! The Apostles, Jesus' mother, Mary, some women, and his brothers (Acts 1:12-14) were together in the upper room pouring themselves into prayer. They were also afraid and confused. We can imagine their discussions as they expressed to one another all that they knew of recent events--what they knew to be true. They prayed together. And the Holy Spirit responded by igniting within them a holiness that manifested itself in language, a language which needs no translation. The Spirit becoming Word. The Word made flesh!


And they left the safety of the upper room and went out into the streets where they astonished everyone with their passion for sharing the Word. When we speak of the mighty acts of God, we speak the same language. It is that same Holy Spirit which drives each one of us to share the good news of Jesus Christ. Let us celebrate the fulfillment of Pentecost—the birthday of the Church—by recalling the Shavuot, devoting ourselves to prayer, contemplating the living Body of Christ in which we dwell, and which dwells within us, and allowing the Holy Spirit to ignite our passion for sowing the Gospel seeds!
