Child Abuse Awareness Month

Did you know?

The Continuing Commitment to Protect Children and Young People

As part of the Archdiocese of Newark's continuing commitment to protect children and young people, this past year, the Office of Child and Youth Protection conducted over 400 Protecting God's Children training programs. Since 2003, over 52,000 employees, volunteers, and clergy have been trained to help prevent child abuse. In addition, all those who continue to work with children must recertify their training every three years.



Safeguarding Children & Addressing Abuse

Archbishop Myers has stated categorically that the primary responsibilities of the Archdiocese are to protect children and young people, and to promote the healing of, and provide compassion to, victims of abuse.The Archdiocese of Newark requires all staff and volunteers working with children and youth to undergo background checks and receive sexual abuse awareness training. More than 20,000 Clergy, Religious and Lay people have received this training and undergone criminal background checks. Nearly 95,000 children annually receive safe environment training through our Catholic schools and through opportunities offered to public school students in our religious education programs.

The Archdiocese utilizes the services of a Licensed Clinical Social Worker as the first contact for individuals who allege that they were abused so that counseling and other support services can be offered immediately if appropriate – sometimes even before a determination is made regarding the credibility of an allegation. A full-time Office of Child and Youth Protection dedicated to protecting children works with parishes and schools to ensure that safe environments are in place throughout the Archdiocese.

How the Church Recognizes Saints

The process of declaring one a saint in the Catholic Church is called canonization. The canonization process is a canonical (Church law) procedure by which the Church through the pope solemnly declares a Catholic to be united with God in heaven, an intercessor with God on behalf of the living, and worthy of public and universal veneration.

A cause of canonization examines a person's life and death to determine if they were either martyred or lived a virtuous life. Every cause of canonization has two phases: the diocesan and Roman phase. The diocese responsible for opening a cause is the diocese in which the person died or was martyred. The diocese, religious order, association, or lay person(s) requesting (petitioning) for the cause asks the diocesan bishop, through a person known as the postulator to open an investigation into the martyrdom or life of the person.

The diocesan bishop investigates how the person lived a heroic virtuous life, exemplifying the virtues of faith, hope, and love through the calling of witnesses and the theological examination of the candidate's writings. If the cause is based on martyrdom, the diocesan bishop investigates the circumstances surrounding the alleged martyrdom, which is also done through the calling of witnesses to the martyrdom and the examination of the candidate's life.

Once the diocesan investigation is complete, the

SAINT OF THE WEEK Catherine of Siena

1347–1380 — Celebrated on April 29

Catherine was the 24th of 25 children of a Sienese dyer; her mystical experiences and raptures began at age 6. She refused to marry, and



about 1367 joined the Third Order of St Dominic. She attracted a like-minded group in Siena for prayer and good works and devoted her last five years to church unity and ending the scandal of rival papacies.

Though she experienced the pain of the stigmata, it became visible only after her death at age 33. In an odd division of relics, her body was preserved in a Roman church, while her head was placed in a Sienese church. Named a Doctor of the Church in 1970, Catherine is a patron saint of Europe and Italy, and the patron of fire prevention, nurses, and nursing. documentation (evidence) that has been collected is sent to the Vatican's Congregation for the Causes of Saints and the Roman phase begins. The first step in the Roman phase is the examination of the diocesan documentation. If the congregation's theologians find the documentation convincing, it is sent for review by the cardinal and bishop



members of the congregation. If they also find the documentation favorable, it is sent to the pope. With the pope's approval, a decree is issued stating that the person lived a virtuous life, thereby conferring the title "Venerable" on the person. The next step in the process is being named "Blessed." For beatification, a miracle must be attributed to the Venerable. The miracle is verified through an examination by a team of medical experts and theologians. The three traditional standards for judging the authenticity of a miracle are: complete-meaning a total healing of the disease, it is not enough for the person to "just" feel better; instantaneous-meaning the healing occurred all at once and not over the course of several days or months; and durable-meaning the person remains permanently free from the illness that afflicted them. Once the miracle has been verified,

This week, color this drawing of the Good Shepherd. Make sure you keep the sheep white though! the pope issues a decree declaring the miracle and the person receives the title of "Blessed." The pope can dispense, though he does not always do so, from the requirement of a miracle for the beatification of a martyr.

A second miracle must be attributed to the Blessed in order for him or her to be canonized a saint. A proven miracle is required, even for martyrs, for canonization. The verification of the second miracle follows the same procedure as the first. Once the person is declared a saint, he or she is worthy of universal veneration by the Church. There are many steps to be named a saint in the Church and the canonization process is lengthy and detailed. This process ensures that the role models held up as witnesses to Christ and the Cospel are worthy of our emulation.
