Safeguarding Children and Addressing Abuse

The Archdiocese Acts to Protect Youth & Children

Archbishop Myers has stated categorically that the primary responsibilities of the Archdiocese are to protect children and young people, and to promote the healing of, and provide compassion to, victims of abuse.

The Archdiocese of Newark requires all staff and volunteers working with children and youth to undergo background checks and receive sexual abuse awareness training. More than 20,000 Clergy, Religious and Lay people have received this training and undergone criminal background checks.

Nearly 95,000 children annually receive safe environment training through our Catholic schools and through opportunities offered to public school students in our religious education programs.

The Archdiocese utilizes the services of a Licensed Clinical Social Worker as the first contact for individuals who allege that they were abused so that counseling and other support services can be offered immediately if appropriate—sometimes even before a determination is made regarding the credibility of an allegation.

A full-time Office of Child and Youth Protection dedicated to protecting children works with parishes and schools to ensure that safe environments are in place throughout the Archdiocese.


Is Poverty Structural Or Simply Bad Luck?

Sometimes people think that afflicted individuals of poverty are largely at fault for their own misfortune. Sometimes people may even cite evidence from what they have observed in passing, a panhandler they see on their way to work every day who is always smoking cigarettes, or a distant relative who seems to be living recklessly, to verify this conclusion. However, poverty is largely a result of structural disadvantage or sometimes just a compilation of misfortunate events that happens in one's life.

ETHNICITY

Unfortunately, there is a disproportionate rate of poverty among peoples of differing backgrounds which implies that structures of poverty are also structures of discrimination. In the United States, the highest poverty rate by race is found among Blacks, which is 27%, with Hispanics having the second highest poverty rate of 26%. Meanwhile, Whites have a poverty rate of 10% and Asians have a poverty rate at 12%. These rates clearly articulate how poverty correlates with ethnicity.



THRESHOLDS

The Poverty Threshold, more commonly known as the Poverty Line, which is established by the United States government to measure fiscal poverty, cannot even be met by those who are considered in poverty. 7% of the population, nearly 20 million people, live in deep poverty, meaning that their incomes are only 50% of their poverty threshold. These numbers indicate that getting out of "deep poverty" is very difficult to overcome.

Not many people in this country are too close to escaping the definition of poverty today. One third of the American population, or 106 million people, live close to poverty with incomes less than two times that of their poverty thresholds. It is much harder to escape this reality when there is not enough money to save in order to cover the cost of unexpect-

ed and expensive occurrences, like a medical emergency, or to invest in agents that relieve poverty such as an education.

CONCLUSION

Being aware of how ethnicity and poverty are connected is very important when considering how to get involved to help. It is important to understand too that there are larger forces at work in the lives of the people who are afflicted with deep poverty or live in near poverty. Sometimes these forces are structural and sometimes they are just the results of bad luck. No matter the cause, being aware of the reality can give you the power to make a difference.

Seeing with Eyes of the Heart

Cultivating a Sacramental Imagination in an Age of Pornography

Pornography is today available and accessible to a degree unprecedented in human history, largely because of the internet. According to one estimate, 25% of search engine requests are for pornographic material, and a Kaiser Foundation study found that teens are exposed to internet pornography without even seeking it out. Contemporary pornography often includes not only sexually explicit images but also verbal and physical aggression against women, and some forms of pornography perpetuate unjust ethnic stereotypes.

What is the effect of a pornographic visual culture on the human imagination? On men? On women? On children and youth? On relationships, marriages, and human society? In the midst of this culture, how can we cultivate a sacramental imagination that beholds in male and female humankind the divine image in which we are created (GEN 1:27) and redeemed (2 COR 3:18)?


Where are you staying?

What is the meaning of the question asked of Jesus in today's Gospel? Were the two disciples who had just met Jesus really interested in his accommodations? Hardly. Scholars indicate the gist of their question was something like "What are you all about?" This was the disciples' response to Jesus' probing question "What are you looking for?" Place yourself in the story. John the Baptist, of whom you are a follower, points Jesus out to you and proclaims, "Behold, the Lamb of God." Say what? So compelling is John's statement that you depart from him and immediately begin to follow Jesus who turns to you and asks about your heart's desire, then invites you to come and see what he is all about. And you listen. The scripture does not provide many details on what happens next, the conversation, or teaching, but it does indicate the time: four o'clock in the afternoon-the time of temple worship-which you spend in conversation with Jesus. Afterward, Andrew rushes off to find his brother Peter and brings him to Jesus, too.




This is how it happens. This is what it means to be an evangelizing people. Everyone who seeks Jesus needs to find out for themselves what he is all about. But when one enters into communion with Jesus they experience union with God! It's impossible to keep something of this magnitude to oneself. It is up to us to respond to the call, give witness, and in doing so, lead others to Jesus, just like John the Baptist and Andrew did.

Pope Francis on Consecrated Life


